Since inception of the program in 1928, through June 30, 2019, the corporation has loaned 6,029 students approximately \$45,228,499.56. For the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2019, Whitney approved interest-free loans totaling \$2,226,844.79 to 103 students: 74 students received loans for the

first time and 29 students had received loans previously. As of June 30, 2019, Whitney has provided \$12,333,447.43 in student loan monies loaned and/or com-mitted to Sheridan and Johnson

heridan area benefactor Edward A. Whitney willed his estate to establish Whitney Benefits Inc., creating the first educational foundation in Wyoming. According to his original trustees, Whitney spent three decades of his life planning his gift to the people of Sheridan County. He made extensive investigations in the East as to how trust funds were structured for education, and repeatedly asked his three associates, later to become the trustees of his estate, for suggestions. for suggestions. The foundation was established in 1927, ten

years after his death in 1917, as provided by his will. In the years since the establishment of the foundation, the earnings from the trust have

Whitney Benefits commits \$25.3 million to Sheridan College

In 2014, Whitney Benefits committed to the largest gift in the history of Sheridan College in the amount of \$25.3 million. In 2019, Whitney continued to fund this extraordinary gift with a grant of \$2,129,093.

The commitment from Whitney Benefits to Sheridan College included the necessary \$1.3 million required to complete the \$8 million

Mars Agriculture and Science Center renova-tion project, \$16 million to support the renova-tion and expansion of the fine and performing arts wing of the original Whitney Building, \$2 million to support infrastructure and parking improvements on the main campus and \$6 mi lion for approximately half of the Tech Center renovation and expansion project.

Whitney supports new residence hall at Sheridan College

In September of 2018, Whitney Benefits committed \$7.1 million to Sheridan College for the construction of a 100-bed residence hall. The new structure will be called Centennial Hall in recognition of the 100-year legacy of Edward A. Whitney's generosity. The payments will be made over a 25-year time frame.

The total project cost is \$9 million with the

The total project cost is \$9 million with the remaining \$1.9 million being paid for by revenue from resident students. The new Centennial Hall will include three floors with traditional rooms, common lounges and study rooms, It is located just east of the Thorne-Rider Campus Center.

Since 1927, when Whitney Benefits was created, 101 dedicated individuals have served on the Whitney Benefits Board of Trustees. All together, the Whitney Trustees to date have dedicated over 1,122 years of service supporting education and building our Sheridan community.

In 2019, Whitney Benefits gifted the city of Sheridan in excess of 50 million gallons of stored Park Reservoir water to assist in watering Park Reservoir water to assist in watering Sheridan's parks, pathways and greenways, including the Sheridan Recreation District's Thorne-Rider Park, Oatts Baseball Complex, Dan Madia Soccer Field and the elk pasture irrigation and restoration project at Kendrick Park. The water for Blacktooth park was added in 2019. Additionally, Whitney contributes water to the University of Wyoming Science and Research Center located at Whitney's Adams! ranch for students and educators with experi-mental test plots, grape vineyards and crop irri-
